How HOTAre We?

Colossians 3:15-25

Believers are to serve the Lord with enthusiasm, eagerness, excitement, passion, fervency, wholeheartedness, exuberance and zeal. Yet, how often do we find our service to be lukewarm,



complacent, lackadaisical, sluggish, halfhearted and spiritless.

Paul's command is clear: "And whatsoever ye do, do it **heartily**, as to the Lord and not unto men" (*Col. 3:23*). "Heartily" literally means "from the soul." One version renders it, "enthusiastically." We should put our whole soul into it!

Each new day of serving the Lord should be an exciting adventure as we learn what God has in store for us. We are to be "fervent in spirit, serving the Lord" (Rom. 12:11). This word "fervent" comes from a verb meaning "to boil, seethe." Spiritually, we should be on fire for the Lord, fired up, boiling, hot, zealous, glowing! God wants us to be hot, to have a godly enthusiasm and excitement for the things of the Lord. As one hymn says, "May each soul be rekindled with fire from above!" And another, "Set my soul afire, Lord."
