
# Always and At All Times

## πάντοτε

#### 1 Thessalonians 5:12-23



**Prayer**: "Men ought always to pray and not to faint" (Luke 18:1; Phil. 1:4; Col. 1:3; 4:12; Philemon 4). **Obeying**: "As ye have always obeyed" (Phil. 2:12). Pleasing God (as Christ did): "I do always those things that please Him" (John 8:29). **Rejoicing**: "Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say rejoice....Rejoice evermore" (Phil. 4:4; 1 Thess. 5:16). Giving thanks: Giving thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ" (Eph. 5:20; 1 Thess. 1:2). Gracious speech: "Let your speech be always with grace" (Col. 4:6). **Unbounding service**: "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord" (1 Cor. 15:58). **Pursuing the good**: "But ever follow that which is good" (1 Thess. 5:15). None of these things can be achieved of ourselves; the victory must come from God who "always causeth us to triumph in Christ" (2 Cor. 2:14). None of this is possible apart from **God's enabling grace**: "God is able to make all grace abound toward you; that ye, always, having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work" (2 Cor. 9:8). In our weakness we have great **confidence**, knowing that "He ever liveth to make intercession for us" (Heb. 7:25). When our work is done, we have the blessed hope and happy expectation that we will be with Christ at all times: We shall "meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord. Wherefore comfort one another with these words" (1 Thess. 4:17-18).

Always and At All Times πάντοτε

### 1 Thessalonians 5:12-23



There is a Greek adverb [pantote] which means "always, at all times." Its New Testament usage is very instructive as to those activities that demand our constant engagement. In the following verses, this Greek word is underlined.

**Prayer**: "Men ought always to pray and not to faint" (Luke 18:1; Phil. 1:4; Col. 1:3; 4:12; Philemon 4). **Obeying**: "As ye have always obeyed" (Phil. 2:12).
