

James 4:8-17

God's Word presents three solid facts about tomorrow:

- 1) We must not boast about what we plan to do tomorrow because only God knows what tomorrow will bring. "Boast not thyself of tomorrow; for thou knowest not what a day may bring forth" (*Prov. 27:1*). "Go to now ye that say, Today or tomorrow we will go into such a city, and continue there a year, and buy and sell, and get gain: whereas ye know not what shall be on the morrow. For what is your life? It is even a vapour, that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away. For that ye ought to say, If the Lord will, we shall live and do this or that" (*James 4:13-15*). We do not even know if we will be alive tomorrow. It is not wrong to plan for the future, but we must place all plans in God's hands, subject to His will.
- 2) We must not be anxious nor worried about tomorrow. "Take therefore no thought for the morrow: for the morrow shall take thought for the things of itself. Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof" (Matt. 6:34). How foolish to add tomorrow's cares to those of today! Tackle today's trouble; tomorrow will take care of itself. The burden of tomorrow's cares added to the load of today's trouble is too much for any saint to bear. We must put all of our strength, energy, and resources into solving today's problems in God's strength.
- 3) The rich fool counted on tomorrows which he never had (*Luke 12:16-21*). He had no room in his barns and wanted to build more; he had no room in his heart for God or for things of eternal value. He thought he had "many years," but he did not live to see one more day! In Hades he discovered how poor he really was.
